WHAT'S ON AT THE RED LION BRINKLEY

We'll be open again from Friday July 31st. As we write, our initial opening times for food will be Monday to Saturday from 5-8 for our dinner menu and 12-2 Thursday to Saturday for our lunch menu. We will not be opening on any Sunday in August.



From July 31st onwards our usual pre-lockdown takeaway menu will be available whenever we are open - lunch or dinner. If you have been enjoying a takeaway and want to continue to do so, please keep ordering!

Any changes to our opening times, and they're going to change once we see what happens once we re-open, will be on our Facebook page (/RedLionBrinkley) and our web page (www.redlionbrinkley.co.uk)

We are registered with the government's Eat Out to Help Out scheme. We hope many of you will take advantage of this. It will help us after being compulsorily closed, and it's a good deal for you! This is available to you for the entire month of August on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday between 5 and 8.

This government funded scheme offers a 50% discount of up to £10 per person, adult or child, with no limits on use, for meals eaten inside or outside. It is not available for takeaway food. The discount is only applicable for a knife and fork meal and any non-alcoholic drinks consumed on property, and is applied to what each individual may order, not the total bill for a table. Working the bill out will be the fun bit!



We will have ten tables in the front garden. The big rectangle will not be available, the two big rounds will be on the old petanque court area and the new tables we ordered last year will be well spaced but not so far apart you can't talk to someone near you that maybe can't sit with you. If you would like to visit with some friends you haven't seen for months but need to be at separate tables, just call - we'll sort it for you as best we can under the current guidance.

Outside tables will be reservable for food, as will the inside tables we are making available. We recommend making a reservation. If you need clarification on who can sit together at a table under the current rules, or whatever they change them to whenever they decide to change them next, please do not hesitate to call us. 01638 508707

Many things obviously must change, and we're not listing them here. We are doing everything we can to follow government recommendations. Not only do we intend to follow all the government recommendations that apply to our situation, we have added a few more we think make sense for this property based on what we have learned from some others around the country that opened in July. We want to make coming into us as good an experience as it can be for you given the current new normal, so it is safe for you, and safe for ourselves.

We're really looking forward to seeing some of you in the not too distant, and completely understand we'll have to wait a while longer to see many others, and we'll look forward to that too when you think the time is right for you.

REFLECTIONS ON WORKING IN THE NHS DURING COVID 19

June 2020

You may recall that earlier this year, I wrote a piece in Village Voice about the breast screening service that was, at that point in time, due to visit Newmarket. However, Covid 19 came along and suddenly at the end of March, we had to pause screening. Now, as hopefully the service is due to restart again, I felt it may be the right time to reflect and maybe share my experience of working in the NHS in these rather extraordinary times. I know I am not the only healthcare worker in the villages and obviously these thoughts are my own, but those who also are key workers may identify with some of my musings.

I am a radiographer, I work in cancer services, managing the local breast imaging department which includes breast screening services. I am not front line in terms of Covid 19, but I have never experienced anything like this all the 29 years I have worked in the NHS. The nearest experience I can compare it to was when, as a newly qualified radiographer working in Canterbury, I was involved in a response to a major incident. A coach had ploughed down an embankment on the M2, people were injured and hurt. Services and staff rose to the challenge and responding with the care and efficiency that the NHS is an exemplar of. Covid 19 has felt a bit like a major incident, a Majax as we refer to them. Normal service in some respects has been put on hold, while we deal with the outfall. It has been challenging and emotionally exhausting, even for those like me not on the front line. I cannot even begin to know what it has been like for those in the frontline, changing parameters daily, sometimes hourly, have had to see the NHS step up to mark and deal with it, responding in new ways. We have engaged with technology and keep going to look after and care for our patients in the way we always have strived to. I'm very proud to say that the breast outpatient clinic where I work has worked throughout, I am so proud of my team: initially referrals dropped off, which may have been a reflection on people not wishing to overburden us, or because of a fear of coming to a hospital and the fear of catching Covid. Fortunately, the message has got through, cancer does not go away, nor do stroke and heart attacks. The NHS is still here and is still seeing you if you have symptoms, as it has done throughout.

There are several landmarks in the time since March which have affected me personally. The clap for carers and keyworkers on a Thursday night initially made me feel a bit odd : I'm just doing what I've always done, my job. Please don't think it wasn't appreciated, it was, but when you see scenes like in Bournemouth recently and locally, massive gatherings at Midsummer common in Cambridge, you can't help feel that these would have

been the very people clapping ...and then doing their own thing. That type of behaviour makes me angry, especially when I know NHS colleagues have died because of Covid. The first radiographer died from Covid in April 2020, Simon Guest from Cumbria: I did not know him, but he was one of my radiographer family and it hit hard, it became real. On a positive note I also received, anonymously through my door, a blue knitted heart and a handwritten note: a simple gesture that spoke a thousand words.

Then there is the worry about potentially bringing it home to my family, but I had to reason with myself that going to the Supermarket is a risk too. For me personally it is about risk and balance. Trying to ensure that I keep as safe as possible and do not put myself or family at risk. Covid cases may be reducing, but it has not gone away, people are still dying.

But I am optimistic that things will get better, and that there will be some long-lasting positive changes. For example, the way the local communities have responded and helped each other, the local village WhatsApp groups being introduced. I have benefitted from this myself. Kindness costs nothing, and no-one became poor by giving.

I hope this lasts long after Covid 19 has become a memory.

### **MARSH MAIL - News from Linton Village College**

It has been an exceptional period of time for all of us. The College community has responded brilliantly to the challenges of remote learning and reinventing schooling overnight. It was great to have around 200 of our students on site for our various provision in the summer term including critical worker childcare, supervised study, Year 10 face to face subject seminars and mentoring/counselling sessions.

Later this month we are planning to welcome back our Year 11 students to collect their GCSE results. This year has proved particularly challenging for this cohort as their examinations and leavers' celebrations were cancelled.

The Centre Assessment Grades that will be awarded to our Year 11s on 20<sup>th</sup> August have been generated through teachers submitting a rank order of predicted grades, based on their best professional judgements. These grades have then been subjected to centralised exam board moderation, involving benchmarking against historical performance of LVC students in different subjects. It is a very uncertain time for our young people as they await the outcomes of this process and the impact that this may have on their next steps. We wish them all the best and commend them on their maturity at this time.

Meanwhile, the College's staff are busy preparing to fully re-open the school in September to all students. The adjustments to school routines and practices will be significant in order to accommodate government guidance and ensure everyone's health and safety. It will be great to have all of our students benefiting from being back in school. We are implementing year group zoning and staggered break and lunchtime, amongst many other measures, to achieve a safe learning environment.

Re-opening the Community Sports Centre has also required lots of modifications to provide our customers with safe access to the fitness suite and other facilities. The Sports Centre team is delighted to welcome members of the community back. Thanks to all of you that support the College through membership and use of this Village College community resource. We can look at all sorts of projects, but they need to have some **educational** purpose. We have helped a range of overseas travel projects, provided money to help buy special equipment for A-level studies and helped with the costs of attending courses and events with the Guides. If you are applying to an apprenticeship scheme, or to a university, the award could help towards the purchase of books, IT, material, equipment and so on. A1307 Update

Work due to start in July will include a new crossing and upgrade of the roundabout at Babraham as well as alteration to the exit from Babraham High Street on to the A1307. This will include the closing of right turn facility. This is a big job and is likely to continue through to the autumn. Also starting work this month will be alterations to the dual carriageway in

preparation for installing average speed cameras and improvements to the Dean Road crossing.

There will be a workshop on the 21st July to discuss the outstanding work on the Wandelbury to Addenbrooks section. There is a review ongoing looking at new options for the Hildersham crossing. The original proposal was for a three-way traffic lights system, but modelling is showing that traffic flows would be badly affected at busy times; this, coupled with difficulties over land acquisition, has led to a rethink. We should be consulted on the new proposals in the next few weeks but no date yet.

Shielded People

From Monday 6th July the government has changed the rules around people who are on the shielded list. They will now be able to meet in groups of up to 6. The County Council is still managing these people on the shielded list, if you think there is someone who needs additional support, do let Henry know.

Library Services

The library service run by the county council is set to restart as of Monday 6th July. The major libraries in Cambridge, Bar Hill, Cambourne, Ely, Huntingdon, March, St Ives and Wisbech will reopen then.

Smaller libraries, such as the one in Linton, will reopen on August 3rd.

Wedding Ceremonies

The County Council's marriage registration service has started up again as on July 4th. They will be prioritising those couples who have had their weddings postponed due to Covid-19.

Zero Carbon Communities Grant

Round 2 of the SCDC Zero Carbon Communities Grant is now open. This year the grant is focussing on three main themes - cycling, community buildings and tree planting & other nature-based initiatives. Applications are invited from parish councils and community groups. The total available is £100,000 with individual grants of £1,000 - £15,000. The scheme opened on Wednesday 1st July and the application deadline is 5pm Wednesday 30th September.

East Cambs District Council has continued to provide all the services that previously operated, as well as administering grants to local businesses that needed help, providing support and help to residents whose income had reduced, and support for the elderly and vulnerable.

The Waste and Recycling team have continued to perform to a high level throughout the pandemic and dry recycling and green recycling was collected every two weeks, with general waste collected weekly.

Most District Council officers continue to work from home, with some time spent in the office.

The District Council has now held two virtual Full Council meetings, with Committee meetings being held virtually as well. ### **Sky Lanterns & Balloons**

Alan presented a motion to Full Council on 16<sup>th</sup> July 2020,

- Asking that the release of sky lanterns and balloons be banned on all property and land owned by East Cambs District Council.
- Asking all Parish Councils within East Cambridgeshire to pass a similar motion to ban the release of sky lanterns and balloons from Parish Council owned land
- Resolve to work with businesses, landowners, communities, schools and individuals in East Cambridgeshire encouraging them to sign up to this initiative.

The motion was passed unanimously by Full Council.

Wildlife, Horses & Farm Animals can die an awful death if they try to eat the remnants of these items and I hope that all residents will support me in trying to stop their release.

There are better and more responsible ways of celebrating

Alan is now encouraging all Parish Councils and other organisations to agree with his proposal.
